Having earned her Applied Land Use Planning Certificate, Angela enjoys tackling the ins and outs of both everyday planning logistics and large-scale development projects.

RCMP

I'm Cam Russell, the newly promoted Detachment Commander of the Stettler RCMP. I have 24 years of experience in enforcement, beginning with the Leduc County Constabulary Service, and onto Regina in 2004 to complete RCMP training. Upon successfully completing training, I was posted to Three Hills Alberta. I was already familiar with small town rural living; however, being a Mountie in a small town brought even more clarity as to how important our role is in the communities we serve, and I truly believe that this is where the most difference can be made.

After specialized training, I was designated as a use of force instructor, which allowed for me to train our members on defense tactics, handcuffing, high risk traffic stops as well as Immediate Action and Rapid Deployment. I am also trained as a taser and firearms instructor. Although teaching and training was a new-found passion for me, I felt it more important that I stay on the road and in-uniform within the community. After 2 years in Fort Saskatchewan it became clear that life in the rural area was more suited for me as well as my family. Having been through the Stettler area many times on hunting and camping adventures, I was quick to apply when the opportunity came up for a promotion to Corporal in Stettler. Luckily I was successful, and my family and I moved to Stettler in June of 2012 where we stayed until November 2018. During those 6 years, in Stettler I continued to deliver tactical training courses both locally and travelling. I also became an RCMP boat operator and having grown up at a lake, boat patrols on Buffalo Lake became some of my best experiences. I was able to build many bridges with outside agencies and work joint force operations, all while mentoring the junior membership on their paths as RCMP members. In 2018 with the nature of the RCMP and movement, it became apparent that a move would be required in the near future. We then moved to Provost in November of 2018, where I served as Sergeant. Provost being an even smaller rural community solidified my appreciation for tight knit communities and I focused on teaching junior members the importance of being part of the community you serve and to not focus on the very small percentage of the population who are often negative. I encouraged members to coach sports, attend events while off duty, shop locally and wave at everyone. I initiated learning opportunities where members were able to go to a farm and ride in a combine, grain cart and other implements, as well as attend a day of branding at a cattle ranch.

Although we were content in our posting in Provost, when the Staff Sergeant position came open in Stettler, it was an opportunity to return to a community that we loved. My family and I moved back to Stettler, settling on a rural property near Buffalo Lake in September 2023. I am very excited to be back in the area and happy to still be wearing a uniform. I will endeavour to build on an already great relationship with the community, continue to teach and mentor our junior membership the best way I know how, and create an environment where the community trust and have confidence in the police that serve them.



COMMUNITY BUILDERS

Stettler as we know it is a vibrant, neighbourly, and generous town. But do you ever wonder how we became the community we are today? Through an ongoing recognition program, the Community Builders Committee aims to uncover the history of the groups and individuals that 'built' Stettler through their various efforts and innovations, with the belief that this history is too crucial to lose.

The 2023 monuments were unveiled in May, honouring the Backstrom Family as Pioneers in Major Construction and Roy & Charles Willis as Pioneers in Media. The accomplishments and contributions of these two families were celebrated in a small ceremony that included the honourees families and friends.

Willis Family

Charles Willis came to Stettler in 1908 and purchased the Stettler Independent, which remained in the family for 3 generations. Roy Willis took over the Independent in 1956 and worked for 68 years. Roy was the first chairman for Stettler's Town and County Fair and in 1955 he was the first recipient of Stettler's Citizen of the Year Award.



Homesteading near Stettler, the Backstrom family built a hardware store in 1905-1906, which operated as headquarters for their construction company. Sons John and Nels were a contractor and a framer and son-in-law Jacobson was a plasterer. The family is responsible for many of Stettler's buildings including the Lutheran Church (1906), the Courthouse (Stettler's first school) in 1908, and the Royal Hotel.





Do you know a Stettler resident, past or present, that has helped make our community what it is today? The Community Builders Committee is searching for candidates for two new monuments in 2024! All submissions are brought forward for review and kept for future consideration.

NEW ROSEDALE PLAYGROUND

COMING FALL 2024

Stettler's north neighbourhood of Rosedale will be getting a significant community enhancement thanks to the Kinsmen and Kinette Clubs of Stettler. The playground, located on the corner of 50A Avenue and 60 Street and often referred to as the Fas Gas Park, is scheduled to undergo a significant upgrade and revitalization which will be led by the two local service clubs. The playground was identified through the Town of Stettler Parks and Open Spaces Committee as the priority playground for the next major renovation, as it features several dated amenities.

Meetings were held with both the Kinsmen and Kinette Clubs of Stettler to discuss the opportunity for them to lead the renovation of this playground, as both groups have done several community playground projects over the years. The Clubs graciously accepted the opportunity to work in partnership and bring a new, inclusive park to the Rosedale neighbourhood. "We are happy to re-engage the neighbourhood through this project," says Kirk Blake, Chair for the Rosedale Playground Project. "A playground is a very expensive project and requires years of fundraising, but we are eager to tackle this project and hopefully gain some new volunteers through the process."



"It will cover the same footprint as the existing gravel play area, leaving the basketball court untouched. There will also be some paving required inside the park for easy access from the sidewalk to the play area"

Representatives from the Kin Clubs and Town wanted to ensure that the space was built around inclusion and as a result, the play structure has been designed based on the following four principles: (1) focus on design for access and mobility; (2) engaging all abilities; (3) incorporating diverse types of play; (4) inclusive for the whole community. While other playgrounds in town have elements of these principals, the new Rosedale playground will be the first to incorporate all four principles in all parts of the structure and surrounding play and landscaped areas.

Like many of the other playgrounds in Stettler, the new Rosedale playground was designed around a theme! With agriculture playing a significant role in Stettler and area, you will see this theme come through the play structure and incorporated through elements like a barn, a farmer's market, sunflowers, animals, and tractors. The playground revitalization is budgeted at approximately \$308,000. Funding sources will include \$120,000 from the Town of Stettler, a collection of government and corporate grants, local fundraising efforts from the Kinsmen and Kinette Clubs, as well as sponsorship and donation opportunities.



The Kinsmen and Kinettes will be planning various fundraisers over the next several months leading into the playground installation. The Clubs will be looking to access 60+ volunteers to help with construction for the playground. If you are interested in volunteering or donating, please contact a local Kin member.

STETTLER RECREATION CENTRE

Time flies when you're having fun, and with all the fun that is had the at Stettler Recreation Centre, it's hard to imagine that on May 1, 2024 we will be celebrating the 30th anniversary of its original grand opening.





After a fire in the summer of 1992 took the former Stettler Arena, Stettler was left with just one arena at the Stettler Agriplex. Plans were put into place to establish a twin complex with the ultimate vision of a community multiplex. Final designs and architectural drawings for the SRC were completed in March of 1993 and after a year of negotiations with the insurance company for the former arena, the town received a \$2.82 million dollar settlement. Although the construction had already started in the spring that year, the insurance money would guarantee that the town could finish the second arena and some of the other detail work. In addition to other funding, a huge part of the funds raised would be credited to local fundraising efforts within the community.

During the 1992-93 skating season and a large portion of the 1993-94 season, local hockey teams and figure skaters would find regular ice time at the Stettler Agriplex and surrounding area arenas. This included the inaugural season of the Stettler Lightning Jr. B Hockey Club which started in the 1993-94 season with all practices and home games out of the Big Valley Arena. Although the Stettler Recreation Centre celebrated its grand opening on May 1, 1994 with a ceremony that included dignitaries such as Community Development Minister Gary Mar and Lacombe-Stettler MLA Judy Gordon, the building was opened earlier to allow teams and skaters in for the final stages of their 1993-94 hockey regular season as well as play offs and the annual figure skating carnival.

30 YEAR ANNIVERSARY

The building has been through a number of renovations and retrofits since opening in 1994. The original building included two sheets of ice, some community meeting space, office space for the Town of Stettler Recreation Department and the Stettler Public Library, which moved in that fall. The first major addition and renovation was concluded and opened with a ceremony on August 8, 2006. This expansion included the Aquatic Center, Fitness Centre, and new community meeting spaces upstairs. A second renovation was completed on April 5, 2014 and included a new front end and foyer area, new staircase, an expansion to the library, and the addition of a senior social centre now known as "The Hub." Other significant projects have taken place since then, including a new ice plant and new LED lighting and low emissivity ceilings in both arenas. Recent renovations were also completed this past summer with the installation of new dasher boards and score boards in both arenas.



Over its 30 years, the Stettler Recreation Centre has become the true hub of the community! It has hosted numerous provincial championships in both hockey and curling, many provincial AGM's, figure skating competitions, swim meets, and so much more. It is a rare space that offers something for everyone in the community from the one-year old taking their first splash in the pool to a local senior playing cards in The Hub. Our Recreation Centre is home to the artist in the Stettler Public Library and the first time class participant at the Fitness Centre. The SRC is now so much more than the original two ice surfaces that the building opened with in 1994.





Various celebration activities will be taking place throughout 2024, so stay tuned and follow the Stettler Recreation Centre on Facebook!



STETTLER REGIONAL FIRE DEPARTMENT



Many residents in our community may sleep peacefully at night, never knowing the commitment made by volunteer firefighters.

It isn't just getting up in the middle of the night no matter what season or temperature; it is also the countless hours they spend on training, truck checks, equipment checks as well as physical strength and conditioning to be able to preform their tasks on behalf of the community. We appreciate the sacrifice they make, knowing that they are willing to give up time with their loved ones to be there and help someone else's loved ones.

The Stettler Regional Fire Department will be looking for new recruits later in the 2023 calendar year. Watch for dates posted on their Facebook page in the near future.

HOLIDAY FIRE SAFETY

As you deck the halls this holiday season, be fire smart! A small fire that spreads to a Christmas tree can grow large very quickly.

Picking the Tree

 Choose a tree with fresh, green needles that do not fall off when touched.

Placing the Tree

- Before placing the tree in your stand, cut off 2" from the base of the trunk.
- Make sure the tree is at least 3' away from any heat source, like fireplaces, radiators, candles, heat vents, or lights.
- · Make sure the tree is not blocking an exit.
- Add water to the tree stand daily.

Lighting the Tree

- Use lights that are listed by a qualified testing lab. Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use.
- Replace any string lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacture's instructions for number of light strands to connect.
- Never use lit candles to decorate the tree.
- Always turn off Christmas tree lights before leaving home or going to bed.

Did You Know?

- Almost one third of home Christmas tree fires are caused by electrical problems.
- Although Christmas tree fires are not common, they are more likely to be serious when they do occur.
- A heat source too close to the tree causes more than one in five fires.

Reminders For Plugging in Your Decorations This Year

- DON'T overload your extension cord.

 Each cord has a

 maximum

 capacity rating.
- DON'T daisy
 chain extension
 cords. It reduces
 the cords wattage
 and becomes a
 fire hazard.
- DON'T' cut off the grounding pin. It may cause a fire or electrical shock.



STOP FALSE ALARMS - KNOW THE NUMBER TO CALL

The Department responds to many alarm calls during the year with few being legitimate calls. Burned toast, hot showers, and smoking are some of the reasons we get from homeowners when we respond to a residence alarm call. Many alarm system owners don't know the correct phone number of their alarm system dispatch to cancel the Fire Department response. They are also unaware that the code they can enter to cancel a burglary alarm will not work in the case that their system is activated by a smoke or CO alarm. Municipalities may charge the homeowner a fee when the Fire Department responds to a false alarm for a second time at the same address within a calendar year.

SNOW REMOVAL

As we move into the winter months and snow starts to fall, it is important to remember winter bylaws and the responsibilities that owners and renters have within the Town of Stettler.

PREPARE

REMOVE DRIVEWAY RAMPS

Please remove any driveway ramps within Town of Stettler road right of ways, including but not limited to steel plates and rubber ramps, by **October 31, 2023**. The Town of Stettler will assist in the removal of the ramps, however, will not reinstate them.



Please remain aware of the yellow "No Parking" snow removal signs placed at the end of each block 12 hours prior to scheduled snow removal. If vehicles are not moved, vehicle owners may be subject to a parking ticket and towed at owner expense in accordance with Town of Stettler Bylaw #1641-06.

TAKE ACTION

SIDEWALK SNOW REMOVAL

You have 48 hours from initial snow fall to clear your sidewalk.

FINE


Should the snow remain on the sidewalk the owner or occupier of the property may be subject to a fine as per Town of Stettler Bylaw #1941-06, Section 405.

ENFORCEMENT

After 48 hours if the snow is not removed from your adjoining sidewalk you may be subject to receive a warning notice.

SNOW FACTS

Snow and ice removed from sidewalks and driveways cannot be placed on any Town of Stettler roads or public property.


